Despite the arrival of Native American and European settlers in the past few centuries, archaeological evidence suggests that human habitation of this region dates back to 10,000 B.C.

Early permanent settlers date back 2,000 years. The dominant Native American tribe in the region were the Potawatomi. Other influential tribes include the Winnebago (or Ho-Chunk), the Ojibwe, the Sauk, the Menominee, and the Ottawa.

In 1848, Wisconsin achieved statehood, and the peninsula was designated as part of Brown County.

The area began to witness the influence of prominent white settlers, including entrepreneur Asa Thorp, who constructed the dock at Fish Creek

By 1850, an impressive volume of nearly 2,500 cords of wood were being shipped out of Baileys Harbor

Finally, in 1851, Door County had gained a sufficient number of settlers to be established as an independent county. Early inhabitants primarily relied on timber and fishing for their livelihood. However, by 1900, excessive harvesting and improved transportation led to the growth of the tourism industry.

By 1920, significant improvements in roads made automobile travel more accessible than travel by boat, resulting in a surge in visitors to the area.

During both world wars, Door County's shipyards played a crucial role in producing military vessels

In the late 1940s, cherry picking reached its zenith with approximately 10,000 workers employed in the orchards.
